THE FOREST

The forest is a mix of Ponderosa pine, Douglas fir and Grand fir, some nearly 100 years old.

Deer, elk, black bear, bobcats, flying squirrels, owls and warblers are among the many animals living in the forest.

While presenting residents and visitors with a wide variety of recreational opportunities, the forest also provides a vital habitat connection for wildlife moving between the West Fork Teanaway River, the Cle Elum River Easton Ridge, and the Yakima River.

Lupine, Trillium and Calypso orchids are among the spring wildflowers you'll find here.

Eight places in the forest are on the Roslyn Register of Historic Places.

In 2004, the City of Roslyn was given ownership of over 300 acres of the forestland that surrounds it.

The City adopted a Land Stewardship Plan to guide the management of the forest. The plan protects the forest not only for us, but also the plants and animals living there.

The forest contains several miles of trails open to hiking, mountain biking, snowshoeing & skiing. Some trails are seasonally muddy or carrying water. Please refrain from using them until they dry out.

Motorized vehicles, including snowmobiles, are prohibited. Hunting, shooting, campfires and woodcutting are prohibited as well.

Pets are welcome but, please, clean up after them.


THE ROSLYN URBAN FOREST THE PLAN

- maintain a healthy forest ecosystem
- provide quality non-motorized recreational use
- protect habitat for wild-life
- manage fuel loads to minimize fires
- protect the forest watershed
- preserve historic and cultural sites
